What is General Obligation Bond C?

If approved by voters, GOB C will fund capital improvements of classrooms, labs and other learning spaces at New Mexico's universities. It will provide \$27.5 million for capital outlay projects for the NMSU system, and over \$131 million for aging buildings at universities and colleges across the state. The funding can NOT be used for anything other than the buildings specified in law (Senate Bill 122).

How will NMSU-A use the Bond C funds?

Out of the \$27.5 million, GOB C also includes infrastructure replacement and upgrades at NMSU's community colleges: \$1 million for NMSU AlamoGordo, \$1 million for NMSU Carbisdal, \$1.5 million for Dona Ana Community College and \$1.5 million for NMSU Grants.

Will my property taxes go up if GO Bond C is passed?

No, you will NOT see an increase in your property taxes.

What other bonds are on the ballot that will make a difference at NMSU-A?

GO Bond B includes \$32.5 million for academic libraries statewide, including those in the NMSU system. Look for the bond items on the **BACK** of the ballot!

FAFSA® Changes for 2017–18

On Sept. 14, 2015, President Obama announced significant changes to the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA®) process that will impact millions of students. Starting with the 2017–18 application cycle, the following changes will be put in place:

- **Students will be able to submit a FAFSA® earlier.** Students will be able to file a 2017–18 FAFSA as early as Oct. 1, 2016, rather than beginning on Jan. 1, 2017. The earlier submission date will be a permanent change, enabling students to complete and submit a FAFSA earlier every year. (There is NO CHANGE to the 2016–17 schedule. The FAFSA became available January 1 as in previous years.)
- **Students will use earlier income information.** Beginning with the 2017–18 FAFSA, students will be required to report income information from an earlier tax year. For example, on the 2017–18 FAFSA, students (and parents, as appropriate) will report their 2015 income information, rather than their 2016 income information.

Live Your Dream Award

Undergraduate female students who are the primary wage earner/source of financial support for their families are encouraged to apply for the **Live Your Dream Award** given by Soroptimist International of Las Cruces. Students from main campus as well as branch campuses may apply.

This is a \$1,000 award. The local winner will then be eligible for awards of \$5,000 at the district level and \$10,000 at the national level.


WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE LIBRARY?



Renewable Energy Program

Phase 1 of Turbine Installation

The students from the TCEN 254 class worked hard on Friday, 21 October 2016, by completing the pouring of 8 ½ yards of concrete. This action was required to anchor four guy-wire anchors, a gin-pole anchor, a base plate tower anchor point, and a winch anchor point.

Thanks to the generous help of Mr. Gil Chavez, instructor in the renewable energy area, the students didn't have to dig the holes. Gil loaned us the use of his backhoe and his expert operator skills, without which we probably would still be digging the trenches for the anchors. With the majority of the holes dug, we only had to ensure they were of sufficient size to hold the anchor rods and the rebar cages. So, some digging and shaping of the holes were required. Hard work in this rocky soil behind the Tays Center.

Prior to the pouring of the concrete, the students were required to build seven rebar cages. This entailed measuring and cutting steel rebar, and forming the cut rebar into cage-like structures to fit in the holes that were dug. Rebar is used to increase the strength of concrete by binding the concrete together. Nearly every foundation of a structure has rebar bound in the concrete.

There were some other conditions that had to be met as we poured the concrete in the anchor holes. The anchor rods had to be set at a 45° angle to receive the guy-wires for the tower. The eye of the anchor had to be set vertically. The anchor rod has a "bell" at the end that also had to be expanded so it would "bite" into the concrete. All of this was done prior to the pouring, but we had to ensure the correct positioning as the concrete was poured into the hole.

The base plate and the winch anchor pads presented further issues. The base plate must be anchored in the concrete with 8 'L' shaped anchor rods. These rods had to be placed in the exact point for anchoring the base plate. To do this, we made a template for the anchor points from plywood and mounted the 'L' shaped anchors in the plywood, then inserted it into the concrete right after pouring the base. When the concrete is cured, we will remove the template leaving the anchors to bolt to the base plate. For the winch, we did something similar. The winch is mounted to a four inch square steel plate, with the winch mounted on top. Four 12", 'L' shaped anchor bolts were used to anchor the winch into the concrete. The winch can be removed leaving the steel plate in the concrete. Since the winch is located at approximately right angles to the tower/gin-pole configuration, we needed to direct the cable attaching the winch to the gin-pole via a sheave block anchor point. This anchor is a 12" long massive eye-bolt, having steel plates mounted in a "cross-pattern" bolted to the eyebolt. This anchor was mounted before the concrete pour, in the location directly under the gin-pole. This is a safety design, meaning we are not under the gin-pole/tower when raising or lowering the tower. One of my students, Mr. Jay Schmidt, is a concrete finisher, so he made sure the base plate and winch anchor concrete pads were nicely finished.




