## FINANCIAL AID and SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

### FAFSA® Changes for 2017–18

On Sept. 14, 2015, President Obama announced significant changes to the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA®) process that will impact millions of students. Starting with the 2017•18 application cycle, the following changes will be put in place:

- **Students will be able to submit a FAFSA® earlier.** Students will be able to file a 2017–18 FAFSA as early as Oct. 1, 2016, rather than beginning on Jan. 1, 2017. The earlier submission date will be a permanent change, enabling students to complete and submit a FAFSA earlier every year. (There is NO CHANGE to the 2016–17 schedule. The FAFSA became available January 1 as in previous years.)
- **Students will use earlier income information.** Beginning with the 2017–18 FAFSA, students will be required to report income information from an earlier tax year. For example, on the 2017–18 FAFSA, students (and parents, as appropriate) will report their 2015 income information, rather than their 2016 income information.

### National Military Family Association Spouse Scholarships

NMFA awards an average of \$500 for career funding and \$1,000 for degrees. Up to \$2,500 is available for clinical supervision towards licensure in the mental health profession. Spouses are also eligible for funding, typically \$1,000, to build their own businesses. This includes entrepreneurs, LLCs, direct sales, franchises, contractors, and other for-profit ventures. Non-profit organizations, please check back in our May application round. Any spouse with a valid military ID is eligible. Apply from October 1st through January 15th, and May 1st through June 30th.

#### Who is Eligible:

You can apply for a spouse scholarship if you:

- are a military spouse with a valid military ID
- are married to an active duty, reserve, guard, retired, medically retired, wounded or fallen service member (must be a service-related wound, illness, injury or death that took place after September 11, 2001)
- are a dual service military spouse
- are a divorced spouse, but ONLY if you receive 20/20/20 benefits or 20/20/15 benefits
- are married when we ask for verification paperwork, usually a month after the applications close

#### Who is Not Eligible:

- Surviving spouses who are remarried, unless they are remarried to a service member
- Children (Check the Defense Commissary Agency Military Children Scholarships at [www.fisherhouse.org](http://www.fisherhouse.org))
- Spouses of former service members, unless they are retired or medically retired

### NMSU-A Continuing Academic Tuition Scholarship

Funds are still available for the NMSU-A Continuing Academic Tuition Scholarship. Please pick up an application at the NMSU-A Financial Aid Office and **submit it by Friday, May 5 at 5:00pm.**

The criteria is:

Must be a continuing or re-admitted NMSU-A student with a minimum 2.5 cumulative GPA and must have earned 12 or more NMSU credits (must not have earned 70 or more credits including transfer credits)

Must enroll in a minimum of 6 credits or more at the NMSU-A campus

Must be a New Mexico resident

Must not be eligible to receive any other New Mexico State Scholarship (this includes LEAP grant, College Affordability grant, Legislative Lottery or Bridge scholarship)

Preference given to a continuing or returning student

Congratulations to NMSU-A Associate Professor Christine Trapp on achieving Board Certification as a Specialist in Gerontological Nutrition! She may now use the designation, RD, CSG or RDN, CSG.

In order to become board certified by the Commission on Dietetic Registration (CDR), the credentialing agency for the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, a registered dietitian (RD) or registered dietitian nutritionist (RDN) must successfully meet rigorous specialty practice requirements and pass a nationally administered examination. Board Certified Specialists in Gerontological Nutrition design, implement and manage safe and effective nutrition strategies to promote the quality of life and health for older adults. They work directly with older adults to provide optimal nutrition and food sources and information in a variety of settings (such as hospitals, long term care, assisted living, home health care, food service industries, correctional facilities, community-based nutrition programs, governmental programs, related industries), or indirectly as documented by management, education or research practice linked specifically to Gerontological nutrition.

The Commission on Dietetic Registration's mission is protecting the nutritional health and welfare health of the public through dietetics certification. CDR currently awards seven separate and distinct credentials.

The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics is the world's largest organization of food and nutrition professionals and is empowering members to be the nation's food and nutrition leaders and optimizing the nation's health through food and nutrition.

Christine is currently only one of two people in New Mexico with this certification!

# THE HAUNTED GARDEN

## The Haunted Garden

When Carolyn Dittmer enrolled in THTR 101 at NMSU-A in the fall of 2013, little did she know that the entry-level class would influence her several years later. In fact, one class assignment contributed to her writing **The Haunted Garden**, this year's family play that is the college's Eighteenth Annual Theatre for Young Audiences show.

"I took the class because I was writing promotional articles for theatre productions and I felt that it would be beneficial to learn more about theatre. I also wanted to expand my appreciation of plays that I attended here and in New York City."

Although Dittmer had always enjoyed writing, she had generally written poetry or newspaper articles. But, when she was required to write a ten-minute play for The World of Theatre class, she discovered that writing for the stage was also a form in which she excelled.

Since her first classroom effort, she has gone on to write ten-minute plays that were part of Senior Moments, This & That, and Funny Zone, the Theatre Guild's fall festival of short plays.

After writing ten-minute plays, Dittmer decided she wanted to tackle writing a longer play and one that would be appropriate for the spring NMSU-A children's show. She thought about a book that had been a favorite of her daughter's when she was young, and the idea grew into **The Haunted Garden**.

"I wanted to challenge myself with writing a longer play, and the Theatre for Young Audience genre appealed to me because I know how much my grandchildren have enjoyed these shows. I also liked the idea of finding a theme that children would like creating, with lots of action and having a message for them to think about."

When writing the play, Dittmer also had to consider if her ideas could be brought to life on the stage.

"I had ideas of kids taking falls and going through a fence and doing actions that may or may not be possible on stage. Then, I started to worry about if anything I had written couldn't be done by young performers."

In addition to being the playwright of **The Haunted Garden**, Dittmer is also the assistant director. She has been with the production from the beginning when auditions were held and has been at every rehearsal, often making script adjustments where necessary.

"The most rewarding part of watching the play coming together is seeing the kids that had no experience in acting blossoming in their parts. It seemed like there were moments when they suddenly 'got it' and made their characters seem real. The process has been interesting. Of course, I love seeing my script unfolding on the stage, but I'm always amazed at how the director has ideas that make it much more than I had envisioned."

**The Haunted Garden** will be performed for local elementary students on May 2, 4, and 5 during the days, and public performances are May 5, 6 & 7 at the Rohovec Theatre. The curtain goes up at 7:30 pm on Friday and Saturday, and the Sunday matinee begins at 2 pm. Admission is \$8 for adults, \$3 for children, and \$2 for NMSU-A students with current ID. LULAC members will attend the New Mexico State University Alamogordo campus in May for the 88th Annual League of United Latin American Citizens State Convention.

The convention is Friday, May 5, through Sunday, May 7, and will include informative sessions, keynote speakers, the Women's Awards Luncheon, the Image Awards Banquet, and a Cinco de Mayo dance. This year's theme is "Fortaleciendo Latinos Atraves de la Educaci3n (Empowering Latinos through Education)."

A national, state and local organization, LULAC was formed in 1929. Its mission is to advance the economic condition, educational attainment, political influence, housing, health and civil rights of the Hispanic population of the United States.

Just being yourselves can be good for the guests at the meal and good for our NMSU-A community.
