Dear Campus Community,



- A reports database with over 20,000 studies and 2,500 exclusive Dossiers and industry reports to provide qualitative and quantitative data

- An extensive selection of infographics for illustrative data visualization as a new learning tool

NMSU-A Spotlight: Robynn O'Leary

If you are passing through the Science Building, at NMSU-A, you should take time to meet Robynn O'Leary, the Assistant Professor of Physical Sciences and Geographic Information System (GIS) Specialist. Hired by the NMSU-A Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Grant at NMSU-A, she brought the project's GIS hardware and software into working order and has developed curriculum that utilizes the system. Ms. O'Leary obtained her Bachelor of Science degree, in Geological Sciences from the University of Texas at Austin in 1998, and received her Master of Science degree in Geophysics from Texas A&M University in 1993.

As it turns out, she is also an effective match to work in the campus' Arts and Sciences Division, where she filled an important niche critical to the Associate of Science degree, where she teaches Survey of Geology (GEOL 111G), The Dynamic Earth (GEOL 212), The Planets (ASTR 105G), and Introduction to the Principles of GIS (OEGS 181). She has worked to improve the existing curriculum and bring online coursework to Quality Matters (QM) standards. QM strives to "promote and improve the quality of online education and student learning."

Ms. O'Leary came to NMSU-A from John Paul II Catholic High School, where she worked as a STEM Educator, and, because she has taught elementary school through graduate level classes, she's a welcome member of the academic community in the NMSU-A area. Prior to working as a STEM Educator, she taught Environmental Geology and Earth Science, as an Adjunct Instructor at Tallahassee Community College. She also taught Introduction to Geology, at Barry University.

In addition to her experience as an educator, Ms. O'Leary is an enthusiastic geologist, who, again, fits well into the New Mexico scheme, with experience in the petroleum industry at the Ocean Drilling Program of the University of Texas Institute for Geophysics, and ARCO Oil & Gas. Having a background at the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, along with more recent training in GIS, she has become involved in the regional GIS community. GIS plays an important role in the management of New Mexico's military activity, vast federal lands, government planning and decision making, forestry and grazing resource administration, and petroleum industry development and planning.

She has served as secretary, vice-chair, and chair for the Science Education section for the Southwest Area's American Association for Advancement in Science (AAAS), and has been published in several journals, including *School Science* and *Mathematics*, as well as *Tectonophysics*, a journal focused on original research and reviews in the fields of kinematics, structure, composition, and dynamics of the solid earth at all scales.

Aside from all that she has done as an educator, curriculum developer, and scientist, Robynn is an amazing person with a generous heart. Her co-workers and students appreciate her positive attitude and playful demeanor. She is a get-out-in-the-community type of person, and she is someone that you should get to know.
